

RULES OF THE NAUTICAL ROAD

The next boating seminar at SIYC will take place on Thursday, June 8, at 4 p.m. upstairs at the Club. The topic will be the nautical rules of the road, presented by George Weston, Commodore of the Solomons Chapter of the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary. This one-hour video and Q&A session presents the legal rules that boaters must follow when operating their vessels. You will learn how the navigation rules apply, the General Responsibility Rule, how accident liability is assessed and what your responsibility is for helping others on the water. You will also learn the proper sound signals to use and when to use them. The presentation will cover proper light configurations on vessels and what lights and shapes tell you on the water. You will also learn skills for operating in restricted visibility and the legal distress signals. Following this one-hour presentation, pub food and drinks will be available in the Captains Lounge.

BoatUS Foundation: 5 Ways to Be Seen and Heard When You Really Need to Summon Help

When you have an emergency on the water, how do you get help? For National Safe Boating Week, May 21-27, the nonprofit BoatUS Foundation for Boating Safety and Clean Water is reminding boaters that having the ability to be seen and heard is critically important. Here are five ways boaters can prepare for a safe summer on the water and, if necessary, summon rescuers to your location.

- 1. VHF Radio A VHF (Very High Frequency) radio is the most reliable way to communicate with other boats and emergency responders on most waterways. New Digital Selective Calling (DSC) radios with a red distress button can even send an emergency call and other important information such as your location to authorities automatically when properly installed and registered.
- 2. **Emergency Beacon** An emergency beacon, such as an EPIRB (Emergency Position Indicating Radio Beacon) or PLB (Personal Locator Beacon) can be activated to send a distress signal to satellites and rescue authorities. These devices are designed to work in remote areas where cellphone coverage is not available. EPIRBs and PLBs can be rented from the BoatUS Foundation.
- 3. **Sound-Producing Device** A sound producing device, such as an installed horn, a handheld air horn, and even a whistle, can be used to signal for help. Five or more blasts from a horn or a whistle indicate danger or a dangerous situation is unfolding. Sound-producing devices are required by law on most boats and can be heard over a considerable distance.
- 4. **Visual Distress Signals** Visual Distress Signals (VDS) such as pyrotechnic flares and certain battery-operated SOS light beacons can be used to signal for help when you're out on the water. Flares and Coast Guard-approved distress lights can be seen from several miles away and are an effective way to signal for help when other methods of communication are not available.
- 5. **Distress Flag** A distress flag is an orange flag with a black square and a black circle. If you're in distress, you can hoist the flag to signal other boats that you need assistance. This is a good alternative for use on small, wet watercraft, like kayaks and personal watercraft where traditional flares could get wet or storage aboard is a challenge.

From Our Club Historian, Mary Gott

We just celebrated one of the busiest times in the yacht club calendar - Opening Day Weekend. As historian I feel we should be reminded of the importance this time is and why we celebrate this time.

Since 1937, when SIYC was incorporated, certain yearly traditions have celebrated. These are the Princess Cocktail Party, the Opening Day Ceremony and the Blessing of the Fleet all will begin and we will begin a new boating season for our boaters and new year at the Club for all our members and the community. It was May 12, 1937, 86 years ago, the first organizational meeting was held. There was no property, there was no building, but there was ceremony and a Princess and was held at the home of George Townsend, who we learned about in March. The home is now the, Blue Heron Inn, on the hill across the harbor.

Each Commodore has had the privilege of choosing a Princess to reign over his or her year. There have been 80 Princesses since 1937. The very first Princess was Althea Bowen McKenny, who we heard about last month. A cocktail party is held for the reigning Princess on Saturday before Opening Day thanking the past Princess for her service to the Club during the past year and honoring the incoming Princess who is introduced to all attending. In 2021, P/C Michael Stanton started a new tradition and invited all past Princesses to attend as guest of the Commodore, which continues today. This year Alise Nicole Werking was our Princess. She is the granddaughter of PC Bill Keefe and Carolyn Keefe.

The Opening Day Celebration is an impressive ceremony held on the balcony of SIYC and is led by the Commodore with the official flag raising by the color guard, the recognition of the bridge, board members and committee chairpersons and a great speaker. The Opening Day Ceremony is the opening of a new year for Club members, the boating members and the community.

The Blessing of the Fleet for the new year is a very impressive and rewarding ceremony where all boats attending were blessed for a safe boating season and it takes place in the Patuxent River. In 2022 we had many boats blessed.

In 1994, the then Commodore Larry Gibbs, added another tradition to the SIYC calendar, the Laying of the Wreath at the Watermen's Memorial. This is now the first activity of the Opening Day as a community event held in the morning at the monument on the boardwalk. It is a very impressive ceremony standing on the boardwalk next to the Patuxent River. For us to take time once a year to remember and honor all of those who are named on the monument is important. These are men and women who worked the waters, they fished, they crabbed, the oystered and boated the Chesapeake Bay, the Patuxent River and the surrounding creeks. Some ran oyster packing houses, crab picking businesses, operated seafood restaurants, boat building businesses, and other water related businesses and they lived their lives enjoying all that the bay, rivers and creeks had to offer. Sponsoring the Wreath Laying Ceremony is our way to show that we remember those people, the part they played in Solomons' history, their sacrifices and their professions. SIYC is all about traditions and history and is constantly doing its part to honor the history of the Solomons Area.

Continue to take part in these events, some of them celebrated for 86 years. Support the club with your attendance!

July: Mostly Mondays and Tuesdays, but many nights open.






